We've all had the experience of seeing a spectacularly flowered plant on a show table or in a display that makes us say WOW! And we perhaps wondered what kind of magic potion it took to get our own plants to put on such a show. While it does take some care and some time, growing specimen plants can be a rewarding part of our hobby for any level of grower. This month's presentation will cover what actually makes an orchid a specimen plant – what the definition is, and what traits specimen orchids have. We'll take a look at the (many!) reasons to cultivate a specimen plant in your collection, and how to go about evaluating and selecting plants that you will succeed with,

Cindy Hill has been growing species orchids for pleasure for over 30 years, beginning on a kitchen windowsill in St. Louis, then onto a patio and 7x7 ft leanto greenhouse at her home in Solana Beach, CA. She moved to the Bay Area in 2005, and now grows around 1500 orchids in an intermediate greenhouse in Berkeley. Her favorite genera include Dendrobium, Coelogyne, Holcoglossum, Miltoniopsis and Laelia. Plants she has cultivated have received highest quality and cultural awards from the American Orchid Society, including Paph. rothschildianum 'Rajah Kumis' FCC/AOS and Den. hercoglossum 'Solana Beach' CCE/ AOS, as well as the Benjamin Kodama and Carlyle A. Luer Annual Awards from the AOS. Her plant Cochlioda vulcanica 'Ganesh' was Reserve Grand Champion at the New York International Orchid Show, and her plants have earned Best of Show three times at the Pacific

Orchid Exposition in San Francisco. Cindy has traveled to observe orchids in the wild in Borneo, Indonesia, Thailand, Guatemala, Ecuador, Peru, and Hong Kong. She has been a member of the conservation committee of both the San Diego County Orchid Society and the American Orchid Society, was Acting Editor of Orchid Digest magazine for five years, and is currently a member of the Publication Committee of both the AOS and Orchid Digest. Her articles have been published in both magazines. She is an accredited AOS judge serving in the California Sierra Nevada Judging Center, based in Sacramento.

The Board has decided to not enter an exhibit in the San Francisco Pacific Orchid Exposition this March. In the past, the SFOC has reimbursed visiting clubs \$150 for the cost of creating a display at their show. Due to budget constraints, SFOC will reduce that amount to \$100. In addition, the Prize money for winning displays will be half of what it has been in the past. New Judging Program in 2011

We are making some changes in how DVOS member plants are judged at our meetings

Beginning in January, we will divide the plant tables into three groups:

NOVICE: those who are new growers, or have few plants and therefore little experience.

INTERMEDIATE: Most of our members. Those who have been growing for several years, know the difference between a Dendrobium and a Paphiopedilum.

ADVANCED: Professional and very successful growers. You know who you are.

LANCER SMITH: species and small plants (less than 6")

1st,2nd, and 3rd place recognition will be awarded in the first three categories.

What does it mean to be an affiliated society of the American Orchid Society? Why should orchid societies be affiliated? I am often asked this question in conversations about the AOS. First and foremost, being an Affiliated Society affords your society a membership in the American Orchid Society and a subscription to Orchids. Society membership provides access to a number of video and slide shows. The Education Committee of the AOS is working on production of more shows and updating some of the outdated video and slide productions. For a listing of the available programs, check out the website www.aos.org on the Affiliated Society page. Your society may borrow any of these programs. A program that AOS is starting to implement on a trial basis will be useful to your society's recruiting efforts. If your society sends the contact information (preferably email) of any new member (forward to affiliated_societies@aos.org), that new member will receive a subscription to the free e-mail newsletter as well as a copy of a recent issue of Orchids magazine with an invitation to join the American Orchid Society. A membership in the AOS will complement your local society membership.

As an Affiliated Society, you have your own AOS Representative. That AOS Representative acts as the liaison between your society and the AOS. They should have information and membership materials relating to the AOS at each of your meetings. The only requirement of that AOS Representative by the AOS is that they also have their own membership in the AOS. In addition, the Affiliated Societies Committee holds a membership breakfast at each of the two member meetings where we exchange ideas relating to societies' issues, programs and the like. Of course, in order to provide AOS judging at any shows, the sponsoring society or group must be an Affiliated Society.
